

11. The central focus of the assessment for a blue card is the protection of children and ensuring that any risks identified by an applicant's past behaviour has now been mitigated It does not assess a person suitability for a particular job, such as a foster carer. This is the job of the employing agency which looks at a number of things to assess suitability including referee checks, employment history and in the case of foster carers domestic violence, child protection and traffic histories.

12. The blue card check assesses:

- national charge or conviction (including spent convictions and pending and non-conviction charges) for an offence (even if no conviction was recorded);
- child protection prohibition orders (whether a person is a respondent or subject to an application);
- disqualification orders (for example, a court may make an order stating that a person who has been convicted of a serious offence involving a child may not hold a positive notice for a stated period);
- if a person is subject to reporting obligations under the Child Protection (Offender Reporting) Act 2004 or Dangerous Prisoners (Sexual Offenders) Act 2003;
- disciplinary information held by certain professional organisations including teachers, child care licensees and foster carers; and
- information that the Police Commissioner may provide in relation to police investigations into allegations of serious child-related sexual offences, even if no charges were laid.

- 13. In the blue card system, certain people are disqualified up front from applying for a blue card. A person convicted for a serious child-related sex or pornography offence or the murder of a child and sentenced to a term of imprisonment is banned for life from holding or applying for a blue card.
- 14. In some cases, the criminal history will not result in a blue card application being refused. For example, minor offences such as stealing, driving or property offences would not generally prevent a person from being issued with a blue card.
- 15. If a person is charged or convicted of a serious or concerning offence which raises concern about the person's background, such as sexual offending, or indecent behaviour, serious violent offending, domestic violence, drug-related offending, offences against children, Blue Card Services will ask the person to respond to the information before a decision about their eligibility to work with children is made.
- 16. In assessing whether a blue card applicant poses a risk of harm to children, the decision maker considers a range of factors such as the nature, circumstances, relevance to childrelated employment and recency of the applicant's criminal history, any steps taken by them to address the triggers for their behaviour, and character references from others in the community.
- 17. A person whose blue card application is issued with a positive notice and blue card which they can use for a number of child-related environments. If a person's blue card application is refused, they are issued with a negative notice which prohibits them from providing regulated services.
- 18. Blue card checks are complemented by the ongoing monitoring of criminal histories of applicants and blue card holders so that action can be taken if there is a change in a person's criminal history. Any changes are immediately reviewed and appropriately actioned, including the suspension or cancelling of a blue card which prohibits the person from working with children, if there is a relevant change in a person's criminal history.
- 19. The blue card system cannot predict whether people will offend against children in the future. They do not guarantee that children will be safe from harm when interacting with people who hold blue card. It is part of a much broader framework for keeping children safe in the community. It complements the criminal justice system and other laws and strategies that work to protect children. These include laws for managing offenders who have committed child-related offences, as well as systems for child protection and the regulation of early childhood education and care. These measures are designed to support parents, carers and families who have the primary responsibility for keeping children safe.

Work to strengthen the foster and blue card systems

- 20. Following the disappearance of Tiahleigh Palmer, the Premier and Minister for the Arts (the Premier) requested the Queensland Family and Child Commission (QFCC) undertake a broad whole-of-government systems review of arrangements in place for responding to children missing from out of home care (OOHC). This also included a review of the information sharing arrangements between relevant agencies with a focus on risk assessments and decisions about safety of children in regulated home-based services.
- 21. On 20 February 2017 the State Government released the QFCC's Recommendation 28 Supplementary Review: A report on information sharing to enhance the safety of children in regulated home-based services (the Report) and indicated support for all 17 recommendations to improve legislation, policies and procedures for sharing information between agencies.

- 22. In addition to this work, QFCC have also undertaken reviews in relation to the blue card system and the foster care system and has made a number of recommendations to strengthen safeguards for children, including:
 - refocusing the system on child-safe standards to manage risk;
 - increasing the range of information considered as part of the check including expanding the range of offences that will result in the issue of an automatic negative notice; looking at opportunities for sharing international criminal history and to conduct New Zealand criminal history checks for applicants who disclose that they have worked or lived in New Zealand for six months or more:
 - reforms to share information, including child protection histories and enabling Queensland Police to provide investigative information to Blue Card Services to assess risks of harm to children.

These recommendations will be implemented as part of a program of reforms to the system.

These measures are designed to support parents, carers and families who have the primary responsibility for keeping children safe.

Work to strengthen the foster and blue card systems

- 20. Following the disappearance of Tiahleigh Palmer, the Premier and Minister for the Arts (the Premier) requested the Queensland Family and Child Commission (QFCC) undertake a broad whole-of-government systems review of arrangements in place for responding to children missing from out of home care (OOHC). This also included a review of the information sharing arrangements between relevant agencies with a focus on risk assessments and decisions about safety of children in regulated home-based services.
- 21. On 20 February 2017 the State Government released the QFCC's Recommendation 28 Supplementary Review: A report on information sharing to enhance the safety of children in regulated home-based services (the Report) and indicated support for all 17 recommendations to improve legislation, policies and procedures for sharing information between agencies.

- 22. In addition to this work, the QFCC have also undertaken reviews in relation to the blue card system and the foster care system and has made a number of recommendations to strengthen safeguards for children, including:
 - refocusing the system on child-safe standards to manage risk;
 - increasing the range of information considered as part of the check including expanding the range of offences that will result in the issue of an automatic negative notice; looking at opportunities for sharing international criminal history and to conduct New Zealand criminal history checks for applicants who disclose that they have worked or lived in New Zealand for six months or more;
 - reforms to share information, including child protection histories and enabling Queensland Police to provide investigative information to Blue Card Services to assess risks of harm to children.

These recommendations will be implemented as part of a program of reforms to the system.

23. Importantly, while the QFCC review recommendations focus on strengthening the blue card system and making it more efficient, QFCC review found that "Queensland's blue card system has always been one of the strongest in Australia".

Any changes are immediately reviewed and appropriately actioned, including the suspension or cancelling of a blue card which prohibits the person from working with children, if there is a relevant change in a person's criminal history.
- 19. The blue card system cannot predict whether people will offend against children in the future. They do not guarantee that children will be safe from harm when interacting with people who hold blue cards. It is part of a much broader framework for keeping children safe in the community. It complements the criminal justice system and other laws and strategies that work to protect children. These include laws for managing offenders who have committed child-related offences, as well as systems for child protection and the regulation of early childhood education and care. These measures are designed to support parents, carers and families who have the primary responsibility for keeping children safe.

Work to strengthen the foster and blue card systems

- 20. Following the disappearance of Ms Tiahleigh Palmer, the Honourable Annastacia MP, Premier and Minister for the Arts, requested the Queensland Family and Child Commission (QFCC) to undertake a broad whole-of-Government systems review of arrangements in place for responding to children missing from out of home care (OOHC). This also included a review of the information sharing arrangements between relevant agencies with a focus on risk assessments and decisions about safety of children in regulated home-based services.
- 21. On 20 February 2017, the State Government released the QFCC's Recommendation 28 Supplementary Review: A report on information sharing to enhance the safety of children in regulated home-based services (the Report) and indicated support for all 17 recommendations to improve legislation, policies and procedures for sharing information between agencies.

- 22. In addition to this work, QFCC has also undertaken reviews in relation to the blue card system and the foster care system and has made a number of recommendations to strengthen safeguards for children, including:
 - refocusing the system on child-safe standards to manage risk;
 - increasing the range of information considered as part of the check including expanding
 the range of offences that will result in the issue of an automatic negative notice; looking
 at opportunities for sharing international criminal history and to conduct New Zealand
 criminal history checks for applicants who disclose that they have worked or lived in
 New Zealand for six months or more; and
 - reforms to share information, including child protection histories and enabling QPS to provide investigative information to BCS to assess risks of harm to children.
- 23. These recommendations will be implemented as part of a program of reforms to the system.
- 24. Importantly, while the QFCC review recommendations focus on strengthening the blue card system and making it more efficient, QFCC review found that "Queensland's blue card system has always been one of the strongest in Australia".
