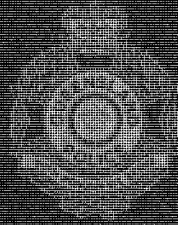

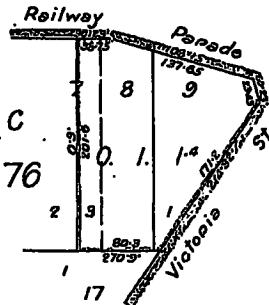

Sir Leslie Wilson Youth Centre (1983 - 1993)

The Sir Leslie Wilson Youth Centre, at Windsor, was a State government-run institution for 'trouble-makers', emotionally disturbed children, and those who had broken the law. It came into being in 1983 and was formerly the Wilson Youth Hospital.

The Sir Leslie Wilson Youth Detention Centre, at Windsor, was formerly known as the Sir Leslie Wilson Youth Centre. A government-run facility, it operated under its new name as a remand centre until 2001, when it closed.

The Commission of Inquiry into Abuse of Children in Queensland Institutions (1998-1999) examined conditions at the Sir Leslie Wilson Youth Detention Centre, and its predecessors. The 1999 report concluded:

Historically, Wilson and the children in it suffered from a power struggle between the Departments of Health and Children's Services, in which the obstinate insistence of the Senior Medical Director that the psychiatric approach must be universally applied prevailed for many years ... The consequences of that situation for the children were an utter neglect of their educational entitlements; a damaging and alienating insensitivity to their needs (particularly reflected in

the admission, sedation and seclusion procedures), an exposure of the children to the risk of physical

and sexual abuse (given the absence of training and supervision of the orderlies employed), and the

unnecessary stigmatisation of children as criminal and psychiatric cases.

In the post-1983 handover period, the problems of Wilson have largely centred around the complete inadequacy of the building itself, with all that this entails for the conditions in which children live there; the lack of proper staff training and the risks of abuse posed by that deficiency; and the insufficiency of the services, programs and education provided. ... it is worth commenting here that they are problems that have existed at Wilson for many years without redress. Many remain to this day (p.162).'

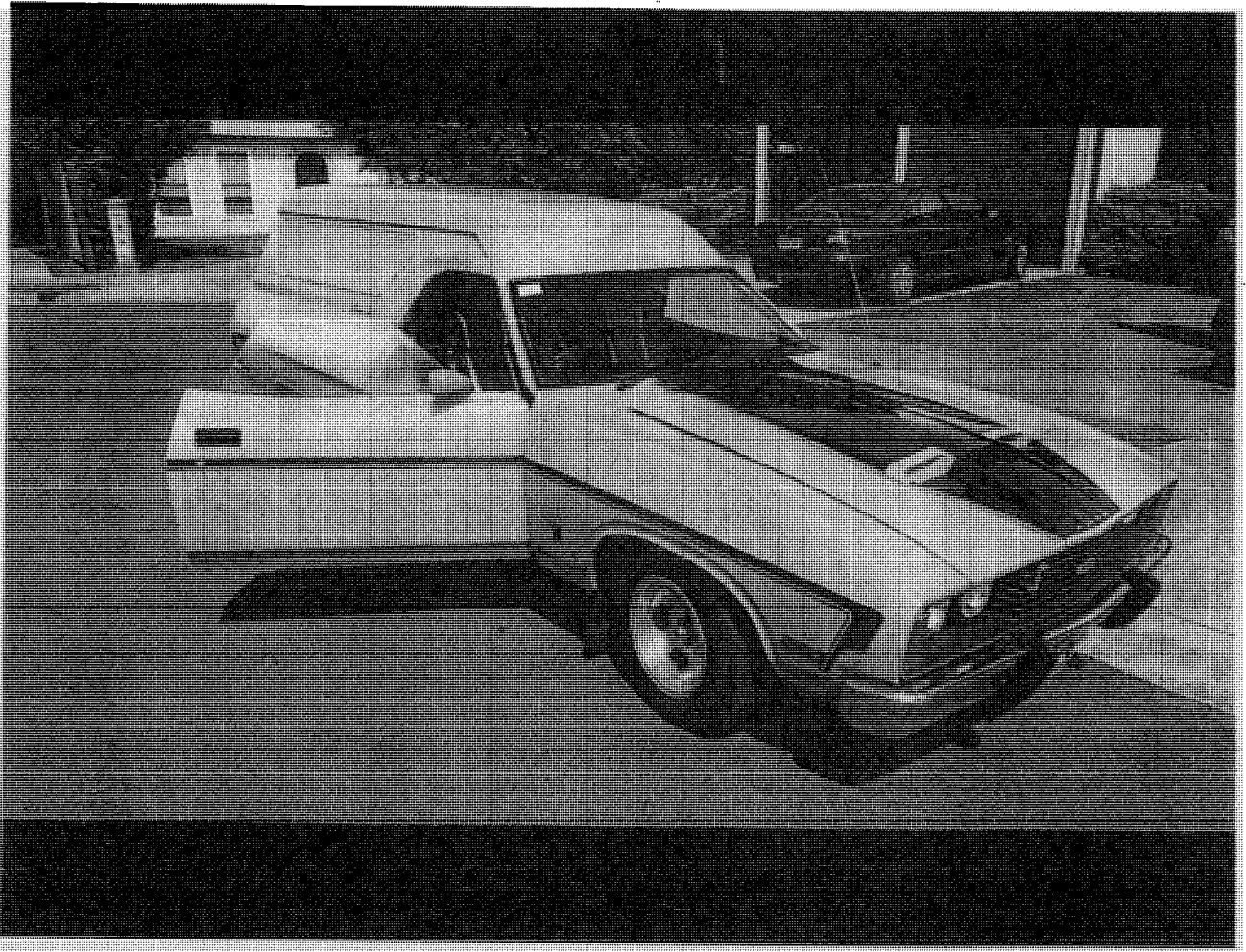
The Wilson Youth Hospital, at Windsor, was a State government-run institution that opened in 1961. It accommodated 'trouble-makers', emotionally disturbed children, and those who had broken the law. The Wilson Hospital was also 'home' to many orphans and homeless children. It was renamed Sir Leslie Wilson Youth Centre in 1983.

In 1961 the Wilson Youth Hospital operated as a remand, assessment and treatment centre for young males between the ages of 8 and 14. In 1971 a section was added to the Hospital to accommodate girls aged 12 to 16. Girls were often held not for committing offences but for being 'emotionally disturbed', 'exposed to moral danger' or 'incorrigible'.

Wilson Youth Hospital was originally administered by the Youth Welfare and Guidance Division of the Health Department, but in 1966 the administration was transferred to the Department of Children's Services. In June 1983 the Department of Children's Services assumed full responsibility.

The Justice for Juveniles Group, previously known as the Wilson Protest Group, was established in 1977 with an aim to find financial support for a Youth Advocacy Centre in Brisbane. By this stage the 'Hospital' accommodated 68 boys and 32 girls. It was considered a 'closed' institution, meaning that children were not free to come and go at will.

The Juveniles for Justice Group was eventually successful and Brisbane's Youth Advocacy Centre was established in 1981.

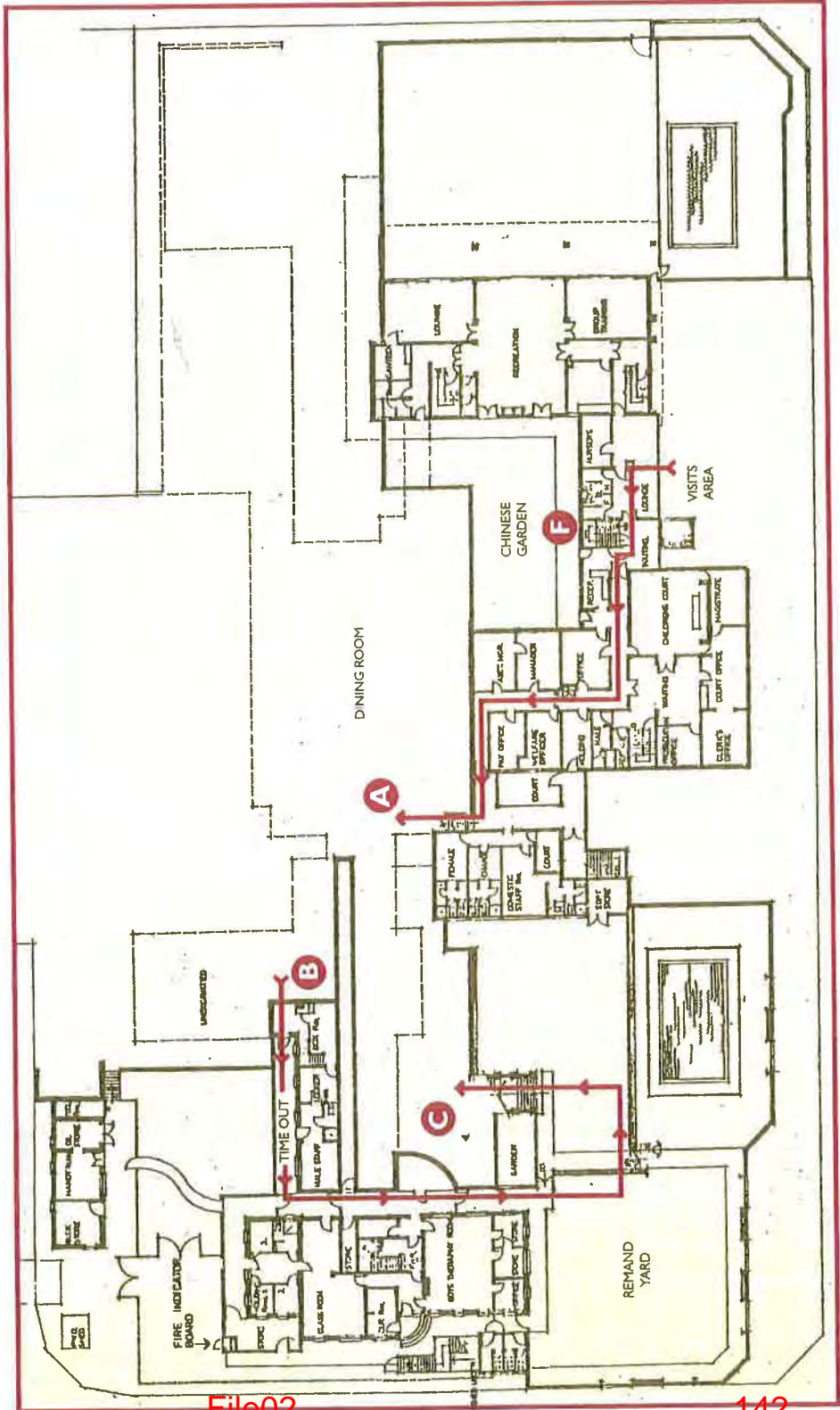

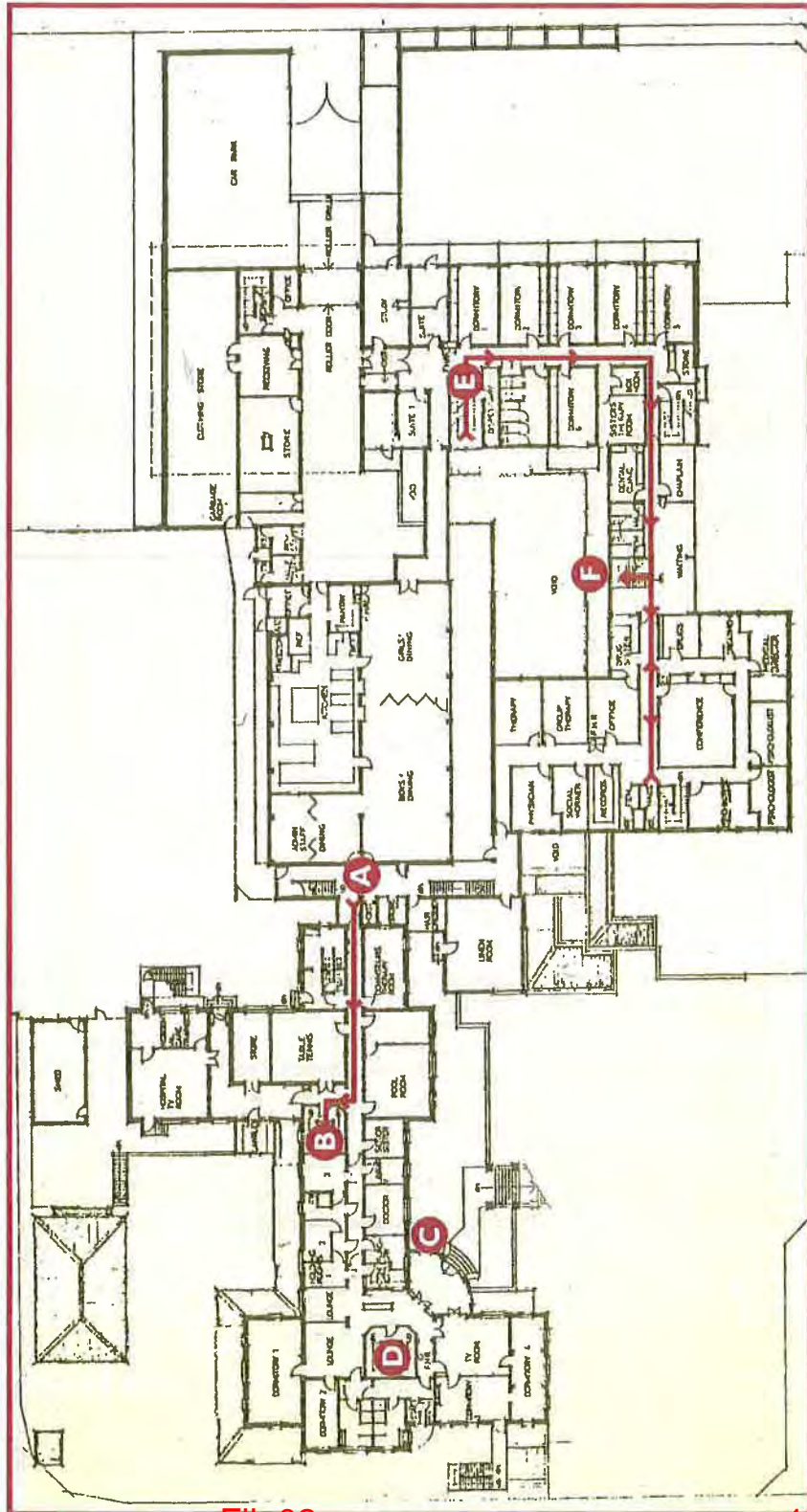
